Australia supporting Ugandan youth

Australia is helping Ugandan youth through its partnership with the Straight Talk Foundation (STF).

Over the past four years the Australian Government has partnered with STF to help some of

Uganda's most vulnerable youth.

Australian volunteer experts have provided mentorship and training in media, special needs and

disability programming, child protection and youth participation.

On Tuesday 12 May the Australian High Commissioner-designate to Uganda, John Feakes, visited

STF to meet some of the young people whose lives have been enhanced. He also met with the staff

and management of STF and Australian volunteers.

Background

Straight Talk Foundation (STF) is a leading health and development communications NGO based in

Kampala, and operating nationally throughout Uganda. The organization grew out of the Straight

Talk newspaper, first published in 1993 with funding support from UNICEF, and was registered in

Uganda as a non-government organisation in 1997.

Using a multifaceted communication for social change model that includes radio, print, and face-to-

face programming, STF targets adolescents aged 10 to 24 years old – in and out of school, married

and unmarried, male and female.

The Australian Volunteers for International Development (AVID) program is funded by the

Australian government and managed in Uganda by the Australian Red Cross.

Australia and Uganda share a warm relationship, built upon historically strong people to people

links. An increasing number of Australians are investing and working in Uganda, building the
